Description

Donat-Cattin was born at Finale Ligure. During World War II he fought in the "White" (Christian-Democrat) faction of Italian resistance movement. In the eighties during the AIDS epidemic, Donat-Cattin was the Minister of Health. Much controversy was provoked at the crisis management and the statements made publicly by the minister.

Following several scandals, and only in 1988 , three years later than the other countries of Europe , the Ministry issued a directive requiring control of pockets of blood for transfusion. This delay meant that many people contracted the virus through blood transfusion and died. Donat-Cattin was also against the use of condoms. Mario

Toros is an Italian trade unionist and politician, and he was under-secretary of the Italian Republic nine times.

Giovanni Galloni (b.1927) is a jurist, academic and politician with the Christian Democrat party. He taught at the universities of Naples, Florence and Rome, where he was Professor of Agricultural Law. He was vice president of the party and deputy secretary twice, in 1965 and in 1977. He held the post of Minister of Education from 28 July 1987 to 22 July 1989, and he was editor of The People (Il Popolo - The Christian Democrat's newspaper) from 1982 to 1986.
