### **Description**

Giulio Andreotti was the 41st Prime Minister of Italy and leader of the Christian Democracy party. Over the course of a forty-year political career, being seen as a reassuring figure by the civil service, business community, and Vatican. In foreign policy, he guided Italy's European Union integration, and established closer relations with the Arab world. At the height of his prestige as a statesman, Andreotti was subjected to damaging criminal prosecutions. Charged with colluding with Cosa Nostra, courts found he had broken the links by the eighties, and ruled the case out of time. Aldo Moro was an Italian Christian Democratic politician and the 38th Prime Minister of Italy. A leader of Democrazia Cristiana (Christian Democracy, DC), Moro was considered an intellectual and a patient mediator, especially in the internal life of his party. He was kidnapped on March 16, 1978, by the Red Brigades (BR), a Marxist-Leninist urban guerilla organization, and killed after 55 days of captivity. Amintore Fanfani was an Italian politician ,

economist and historian. His political action was important because he is considered, along with Aldo Moro , Pietro Nenni , Giuseppe Saragat and Ugo La Malfa , one of the architects of the policy shift of the center-left , with which the Christian Democrats wanted to secure the co-operation of the government Italian Socialist Party
