Graffiti on the wall: 'Occorsio - Violante - Tamburino - Saccucci: vi impiccheremo!!' ['Occorsio, Violante, Tamburino, Saccucci: we will hang you!!'] Vittorio Occorsio (1929-1976) was a magistrate who investigated crimes committed by the extreme right-wing activists (Ordine Nuovo, Avanguardia Nazionale, etc).He was actively dissolving and outlawing Ordine Nuovo, when he was assassinated by a militant from that group on 10 July 1976. Luciano Violante (1941) is a left-wing politician;in the mid-70s he was a magistrate primarily working against terrorism. Giovanni Tamburini (1943) is a judge, who in the 1970s was primarily investigating the criminal activities of the neo-fascist activists and the links between the secret services and criminal, politically motivated groups. Sandro Saccucci was one of the leaders of the aborted coup d'état that would have taken place in 1970, a plan named 'Operation Tora Tora' put in action by Avanguardia Nazionale. The Italicus Express massacre was a terrorist bombing in Italy on a train of the public rail network. During the early hours of 4 August 1974, the bomb attack killed 12 people and wounded 48. Responsibility was claimed by the neo-fascist terrorist organization Ordine Nero. The Ordine Nero (Italian: 'Black Order') was an Italian militant fascist group founded in 1974 following the government's dissolution

of the right-wing Ordine Nuovo. Between 1974 and 1978, bombings by ON led to a number of woundings and several deaths.
