**Description**

Giovanni Leone was an Italian politician. He was the 37th Prime Minister of Italy from 21 June 1963 to 4 December 1963 and again from 24 June 1968 to 12 December 1968. He also served as the sixth President of the Republic from 1971 to 1978. Amintore Fanfani was an Italian politician and Prime Minister of Italy. He was one of the best-known Italian politicians after the Second World War, and a historical figure of the left-wing section of the Christian Democrats. Fanfani was one of the dominant figures of the Italian Christian Democrats for over three decades. Giulio Andreotti was the 41st Prime Minister of Italy and leader of the Christian Democracy party. Andreotti achieved cabinet rank at a young age and occupied all the major offices of state over the course of a forty-year political career, being seen as a reassuring figure by the civil service, business community, and Vatican. In foreign policy, he guided Italy's European Union integration, and established closer relations with the Arab world. Admirers of Andreotti saw him as having mediated political and social contradictions, enabling the transformation of a substantially rural country into the fifth-biggest economy in the world. Critics said he had done nothing against a system of patronage that had led to pervasive corruption. Emilio Colombo was an Italian politician and the Prime Minister of Italy from 1970 to 1972. He was a member of the Christian Democrats Benigno Zaccagnini was an Italian

politician and physician. Zaccagnini was among the founders of the Democrazia Cristiana (Italian Christian Democracy party). He was confirmed at the Chambers of Deputies until 1979, when he was elected to the Italian Senate. Flaminio Piccoli was an Italian politician, and a member of Christian Democracy. He was elected national secretary of the Christian Democrats party in January 1969, and was later Minister of the State Participations for three governments.
